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Learning Procedures

1. Activating Strategy: Acrostic Poem

- a. Display either the name of the town, county, state (or state abbreviation if you are short on time) and instruct students to write an acrostic poem using the name displayed. Students will need to write a word or phrase for each letter of the word.
- b. Allow a couple of student volunteers to share their work. Ask the class (or the author) how their poem reflects how they feel about the place the poem is about.
- 2. Show the class the trailer or a clip of your choosing from the movie October Sky.
 - a. <u>Link to October Sky (1999) Trailer |</u>

 - b. Provide any necessary helpful background information to students (i.e. setting of the movie, information about Homer Hickam, *Rocket Boys*, Coalwood, WV, etc.)
 - c. Ask students to describe how the town was portrayed and what emotions did the trailer evoke.
 - i. Invite students to dig deeper once an emotion is identified—what did the writers and actors do to evoke this emotion? Does it relate to how Homer Hickam feels about Coalwood today?
- 3. Divide students into small groups of 3-4 students/group. Assign each group an essay, short story, novel, poem, song, or feature film to analyze. A list of several resources is provided (attached). For longer works and feature films, it may be best suited to provide an excerpt in place of the whole work.
 - a. Allow students to review and discuss their assigned work for 10-15 minutes depending on your time constraints. At the end of the time frame, each group should share how their work expresses personal attachment to a specific place or region.
 - As each group shares, add it to a graphic organizer for the class. A template is attached.
 - c. If time allows, have students switch essays, short stories, novels, poems, songs, and feature films in a Rotation or Stations style activity.
- 4. Provide students with the concluding assignment. Students will write an essay, short story, poem, or song (or novel if time allows) that expresses their attachment to a particular place or region. Students can also have the option to create a short film or film trailer to express their attachment to a particular place or a region. A sample rubric and instructions page is provided.

Outcome & Assessment Strategies

Outcome:

Students will interpret and identify the ways in which people express attachment to places and regions through essays, novels, poems, short stories, feature films, and songs.

Assessment Strategies:

- Graphic Organizer: Students identify various ways authors and performers express attachment to places and regions by analyzing different works.
- Student Projects: Students utilize their own creativity to express their attachment to a particular place or region.

Instructions:

Think of a particular place or region that is important or otherwise memorable to you. Choose **ONE** of the project types below to express your attacment to that place or region. At the conclusion of your project, **write a personal statement with a minimum of 5 complete sentences** that: (1) identifies the particular place or region by name, (2) clearly states your personal ties to the location, (3) offers insight as to why you chose that place, and (4) any other additional relevant information that you would like to add.

ESSAY

Write a 5-paragraph essay that captures your attachment to a particular place or region. Include at least 2 literary devices (i.e. similies, metaphors, imagery, etc.) within your writing.

SHORT

Write a short story complete with fictious names and characters that capture your attachment to a particular place or region. Be sure identify your plot, character(s), setting,

SONG

Write and perform (either pre-recorded or performed live in class) a song that captures your attachment to a particular place or region. Include at least 2 verses and a chorus as well as at least 2 liteary devices. Your song should be at between 3 and 5 minutes long.

CHILDREN'S

Write and illustrate a children's storybook with a minimum of 12 pages. Your story and illustrations should capture your attachment to a particular place or egion and engage readers in its plot, characters, and setting.

DRAMA

Write a script for a bite-sized play (no more than a 5-minute performance) that captures your attachment to a particular place or region. Your script should include all of the essential elements of a story in addition to character dialogue, notes on setting, and stage directions.

GRAPHIC NOVEL

Write a mini graphic novel complete with illustrations and dialouge that captures your attachment to a particular place or region. Be sure to include a clear beginning, middle, and end to your story. You should have a minimum of 20 panels.

FILM

Create a trailer for a movie that captures your attachment to a particular place or region. Your trailer must include depictions (illustrated or live) of the setting, at least two characters, and an exciting introduction to the plot. Your trailer should be at least one minute long, but no more than three minutes long.

NOVEL REVIEW

Pretend that you have just read a novel that features a particular place or region that you have an attachment to. Write a Critic's Review between 500-750 words about the story. Be sure to include statements about the plot, character(s), theme, and your personal connection with the featured setting.

POEM

Choose one of the following types of poems:

Acrostic Blank Verse Cinquian
Concrete Free Verse Limerick
Ode Sonnet

Write a poem that captures your attachment to a particular place or region. Include at least 1 liteary device and be sure to follow the rules for the form of your poem.



Do not forget to write your personal statement of at least 5 complete sentences!
