Title of Lesson:

Transportation in WV - Road Trip

Grade level:

8th Grade

Summary: Students will be able to design a trip to a destination in West Virginia a specific landmark

Essential Questions:

• Students will be able to plan and execute a road trip to a destination in West Virginia to visit a specific landmark.

Materials:

- Road Trip handout (attached)
- Computer
- Computer paper
- Crayons
- Colored pencils
- Pencils
- Rulers

Learning Plan:

- Divide students into groups of two with a technological device
- Give each group a handout and review directions
- Put the address of the school as the starting point on Google Maps
- Have the group decide on a town to visit / find a landmark or tourist attraction to visit in that community
- Research the address of the landmark and put that address into Google Maps and the destination
- Collect information of how many miles and time to the destination (based upon the desired route chosen)

- Answer questions on the handout about the trip from Google Maps
- Next, allow students to choose a vehicle to drive on their trip (must get GPA Highway miles)
- Must calculate how much money would be needed for the trip there and back
- Create a postcard of the landmark visited with a note about what they did on the trip
- Must be addressed to the teacher with the school's address using the correct format for a postcard
