Essential Questions:

• In what ways is the U.S. Constitution the same as the WV Constitution?

Materials:

- Textbook
- Pencil
- Notebook paper
- Venn Diagram

Learning Plan:

- Have students to answer the six questions comparing the West Virginia Government to the United States Government (15 minutes)
- Pair /Share answers with another student
- Divide students into groups of two and have them compare the Preamble of the U.S. Constitution to the Preamble of the WV Constitution putting information into a Venn Diagram (15 minutes)
- Share out in a whole group with a whole class Venn Diagram on white board, poster board, or smartboard (10 minutes)
- Give each group a copy of the vocabulary match-up to complete so they become familiar with the vocabulary needed to understand government

Checking for Understanding:

- Completion of questions
- Venn Diagram completion
- Vocabulary Match-up
- Exit Slip (What is the importance of having constitution?)

Accommodations:

Pair struggling readers with better readers and allow discussion for better comprehension.
