Title of Lesson: Robert E. Lee in West Virginia							
Grade level: 8 th Grade							
Summary:							
Through this lesson, students will learn about the experiences of Robert E. Lee in West Virginia during the Civil War. Students will learn about the battles/conflicts Lee participated in throughout the region. Students will understand Lee's successes or failures in West Virginia during the Civil War. Further, students will compare Lee's record as a commanding officer in the early years of the Civil War vs. the latter years.

Essential Question (content):							
- In what battles did Robert E. Lee fight in West Virginia during the Civil War?							
 Could Lee's actions in West Virginia be considered a failure or success? What is the legacy of Robert E. Lee in West Virginia during the Civil War?

Learning Plan:

- 1. Students will begin the lesson by viewing a Civil War in 4 video from the American Battlefield Trust on Robert E. Lee.
- 2. Next, students will discuss the battles of the Northwest Virginia campaign (i.e. those battles which took place in present day West Virginia).
- 3. Students will then read the article from wvculture.org about Lee and the Northwest Virginia campaign to gain more information about the events of the campaign.
- 4. Students will be given a brief chart and map to complete detailing the battles of the campaign. This chart will include information on the date of the battle, its location, casualties, victor, etc. Students will utilize a mobile computer lab or computer lab to complete the chart with a partner.
- 5. After completing the chart, students will answer a series of questions which will require analysis of the data in the chart as well as the map of the battles.
- 6. Students will then write a letter from Robert E. Lee to Confederate president Jefferson Davis summarizing the campaign and its success or failure. Students will be required to defend Lee's actions in the conflicts and argue for his continued command of the Army of Northern Virginia.

Checking for Understanding:

Students will demonstrate their comprehension of the role of Robert E. Lee in the Northwest Virginia campaign through their completion of the analysis questions related to the chart, as well as the information used to reinforce the arguments of their letters to Jefferson Davis about Lee's command. Students will also participate in class discussions on the material which will further serve to demonstrate their comprehension of the material to the instructor.


Accommodations:

Accommodations for this lesson may include providing students with a completed chart to use to answer the analysis questions as opposed to asking students to research the answers. Students may also be assigned to work with a partner to complete the letter writing assignment. Advanced students could be asked to complete an alternative writing assignment. Students could be asked to take a side as to whether Lee should have retained his command after the campaign in western Virginia and argue their respective side through arguments backed with evidence. This would allow students to form their own opinions and draw conclusions about the leadership abilities of Robert E. Lee. Name: _____
